

California's Healthcare Districts Without Hospitals: Challenges and Opportunities

Some healthcare districts used to operate hospitals that have since been sold or closed, while others have never operated one. Roughly 30 healthcare districts do not operate hospitals but provide a range of other services. Some programs include comprehensive medical clinics, ambulance services, assisted living facilities, childhood obesity prevention, chronic disease management, grant making, nutritional counseling, physical education, and substance abuse programs. - * Be available to media inquiries and interview requests. Be prepared, informed and direct in your response.
- * Be positive and well-informed about the conference and its importance to LAFCo. Commissioners and staff must have access to best practices and current information to serve the community effectively.
